Ideal Development Agency (IDA) is a women-driven organization in the predominantly mining district of Kendujhar, Odisha, India. The bounty of the nature in this region, however, has a flip side to it: the presence of the most defenseless communities suffering acute poverty. Rampant mining activities have had a massive impact on the life of the indigenous inhabitants, forcing them to live in the most unhealthy conditions imaginable. They are highly susceptible to hunger and myriad diseases though the area contributes to the state exchequer immensely. This situation upset a daughter of the land and convinced her about the need to do something for the suffering people in the region way back in 1992. And the realization resulted in the birth of "IDEAL".

The objective was clear from day one: working for the destitute and the less advantaged, those best with problems, excluded from social security systems and alienated from the mainstream development process. **The Civil Society Awards- 2006 by UNAID** conferred on IDA bears testimony to our determined effort and small contribution to make the society a better and healthier place.

Project Summary

.1. Project Objectives:

- 3000 smaller farmers would be mobilized in to producer groups (PG) & Producer company
- At least 25 PG would be formed out of which 80% would be meet grade A & B category
- High value vegetables would be selected & would be cover at least 1000 acres per block per year
- 20 no's of agriculture entrepreneurships to develop.
- 400 acres would be brought under irrigation
- 200 acre would be cover under Horticulture plantation
- Grading, Shorting, packaging would be done at PG Level
- Around 2100 farmers would be cover under farm mechanization
- 40 % of farmers would practice NPM
- 1000 farmers would be take up improved livestock rearing out of which 750 families would be shed with intensive rearing
- Double income would be of 2100 families 70%
- Promoted PC would be vibrant and providing services to the farmers.

.2. Major interventions planned for the reporting period (in Brief):

- The end of 31st March we have completed 3001 nos of household successfully and involve them in PG.
- Successfully completed Staff orientation regarding PC formation and BOD selection in organisation level.
- There are 25 nos of PG level meeting completed regarding PC formation.
- For Micro irrigation we have involved 40 nos of farmers against 200 acres for Sprinkler installation and subsidy released from the department of Horticulture @1601000/-.
- The project involved 23 nos of PGs high value crop in summer planning
- Subsequently Winner crop cultivation for the Summer season, selected crops are Watermelon, Okra and Bittergaurd.
- Till 31st March we have successfully collective marketing 64 lakhs.
- Generated 25 nos of application for cheque book issue in PG level, out of above we have received 25 nos of PG Cheque book from the concern bank.
- Organised 4 nos of Capacity building training with interface event with the Govt stakeholders for PG dynamic.
- In farm mechanisation we linkage subsidy 8 nos of farmers by the line department to purchase Power tiller and Power Weeder at Nirabahal and Domposh.
- 5 nos of Goat shed and 1 no WSHG mode Poultry farm successfully completed and leverage by the Veterinary department.

- The project involved 18 no of PGs for Synchronised production of the planned crops as per APC principles.
- A total area of 2135 acres was covered with high-value crops including vegetables, pulses, oilseeds, and high-value paddy.
- 2424 households were involved in cultivating high-value crops such as vegetables, pulses, oilseeds, and high-value paddy.
- A total net area of 1454.6 acres was covered with high-value vegetable crops.
- During the Kharif season, a total area of 449.1 acres was covered with high-value vegetables, involving 764 households.
- During the Rabi season, a total area of 686.3 acres was cultivated with high-value vegetables, involving 1521 households.
- During the Summer season, a total area of 319.2 acres was dedicated to cultivating high-value vegetables, with the active participation of 780 households.
- A total area of 158.36 acres was dedicated to fruit tree plantation, with the participation of 70 households.
- 19 PGs were engaged in collective marketing, resulting in a total volume of 1922.68 quintals of produce sold collectively, amounting to 64.24 lakhs.

- 5 Goat sheds have been constructed under the OMBADC and State Plan Scheme.
- One broiler farm with a capacity of 2000, operated under the Women Self-Help Group (WSHG) mode, and one Piggery farm unit have been completed by the Veterinary department under the State Plan Schemes.
- A total of 195 households are engaged in intensive backyard poultry rearing (following PoP), while 297 households are involved in intensive goat rearing (following PoP).

Special Programme for Promotion of Millets in Tribal Areas of Lathikata Block of SundargarhDistrict

From 1st June 2021 IDA is working in the special Programme for Promotion of Millets in Lathikata Block of Sundargarh Dist. With partnership of DMF, Sundargarh, ATMA, Sundargarh, Odisha Millet Mission WASSAN, Secunderabad.

System of Millet Intensification was pioneered by IDA in Sundargarh District, we are growing with 3185nos. of small farmers covering 1000 ha in kharif season . The success of one farmer, Risha Barla, who harvested a yield almost 2 times more in comparison to traditional methods, had a striking impact that motivated IDA as an organisation to scale up the technology, and also small farm holders started adopting the SMI principles to address their food insecurity. The experience of more yields with less investment was the driving force for IDA to scale up the practice to Lathikata block of Sundargarh District. The technology is popularized through video disseminations, wall paintings, posters, skill trainings, demonstrations in farmers' fields, and felicitations and awards for successful/innovative farmers. Alternative care for the vulnerable children

There are more than 3000 children from 2076 households in our operational area who are vulnerable to abuse and hardships of life. They are deprived of basic education, nutritious food and emotional stability, all of which are essential to grow into a healthy, productive citizen. The support system comes from a stable family. Unfortunately, fast changing lifestyles and breaking down of social fabric due to the advent of mining culture is eroding this safety net. Many parents are migrating, leaving their children behind. Single parents are finding it difficult to provide for their children. Many terminally ill parents and families who have lost their livelihood cannot do justice to their parental duty. IDA intervened and created a security umbrella of foster parents/family care givers who are equipped to offer children security, let them grow up as normal human beings and can provide appropriate care. Foster/kinship families and vulnerable families receive support in obtaining an income for the whole family and for taking care of the foster children. Entrepreneurship training is provided to foster families to create an alternative livelihood so that they can take care of their children better. Foster families receive the required training and counseling to play their roles as parents better. More than 2000 children have received the support under the project and are leading a better life with an education, improved security and emotional stability.

Better access to Government Schemes

IDA strongly believes in the convergence of efforts. Government has multiple schemes for the poor and underprivileged. But due to lack of awareness among the people about the schemes on offer, most people in the community failed to avail the facilities provided by the Government Agencies earlier. As part of its public responsibility of working with the communities in its operational area, IDA has made them aware of the various developmental schemes for the people. It facilitated various schemes like IAY, Biju Pakka Ghar Yojana, IHHL, AWC Building, Ration Cards to BPL and APL families, Pension to the Old and Widows and various farmers' development schemes run by both the state and Central Government on a regular basis. IDA has also initiated various water supply and irrigation programme of government in its project areas. Through this effort 7000 families have benefitted through better access to social security schemes and support schemes to improve their living standard. Promotion and Income Generation Activities through SHGs IDA has groomed 1350 all-women Self Help Groups (SHGs) from the vulnerable families, providing trade specific income generation projects to make them good entrepreneurs and raising the level of their family income. 660 SHGs were trained in two specific trades, Food processing (preparation of Badi) and Animal Husbandry. Now 7 SHGs are involved in Badi making, 3 in Poultry Farming, 2 in Goat rearing and 10 in Mushroom Cultivation.

Health

Prevention of Occupational and Contagious Diseases Rampant cases of occupational diseases like Respiratory disorders, Silicosis, T.B., Manganese poisoning, Pneumoconiosis, cancer of lungs and skin problem are found among the community members engaged in mining activities. Contaminated surface and even ground water leads to water related diseases. Malaria is widely prevalent in the mining areas as the abandoned mines have stored stagnant water encouraging mosquito breeding. The air is highly polluted for inhalation due to non-stop dumping and transport activities of dusty mineral rich stones. With several mines set to shut down in the next few years, working as daily labourer in the hazardous mining activities is no more a secure, dependable, sustainable and long term livelihood option. IDA is committed to address this ever-increasing issue through campaigning, linkage with Government agencies, and community awareness along with preventive measures as best practices in mines and adjacent areas. We have reached out to 15000 families through this intervention and intend to focus even more on this area in future. The presence of a large floating population and - most importantly - more than 1, 00, 000 truckers in the area combined with the mining culture have escalated the cases of HIV/AIDs and STDs. The young tribal girls are sexually exploited and catch these dreaded diseases due to unsafe sexual practices and unhygienic living conditions. This spreads to the community through these young girls/women. As per an estimate, more than 267 such cases have been identified. In the area. IDA has made a methodical intervention to counter this situation through a project called APSHRA, (Appropriate Prevention of STI/RTI/HIV&AIDS' in Keonjhar District of Odisha). The focus is on improving the knowledge base, bringing a change in the attitude & risk behavior of the target population on STI/RTI/HIV/AIDS and reducing stigma & discrimination in the community. We have reached out to 540 victims and vulnerable members of the community leading to cure, management of cases and, most importantly, developing a shield of prevention based on sound understanding on the taboo topic

Health and Hygiene Awareness Campaign

Ensuring a healthy life is one of IDA's core areas of intervention. We regularly organise health camps, especially for children, adolescent girls, and women, in our project areas for the unreached communities.

Advocacy and Campaigns

IEC Campaign on WASH: School programs, GP level campaigns, WASH Raths, village sanitation drives, observation of world sanitation day, etc were organized under this program. Family Convention: Interfaces were organized annually with families and stakeholders on different issues to address their problems. The idea behind this program was to solve the problems of the vulnerable persons facing different problems in their lives. Child Club Activities: We have 25 child clubs, which organize child conventions, child agency, street play etc on issues like eradication of child marriage/labour, school dropout that affect their lives. Awareness Campaign on HIV-AIDS: a mega program was organized in northern part of Odisha covering Keonjhar, Angul, Jajpur and Sundargarh.

ANANDASHRAM OLD AGE HOME AND SAI ANAND GROUP OF SCHOOLS

The Old Age Home and the Schools are two unique initiatives of IDA. Anandashrama Old Age Home is the first and flagship programme of IDA. This Old Age Home and the Sai Ananda Schools are an integral part of our myriad activities. The Ashrama gives special emphasis to old age persons, both women and men, who are from the economically poor families and do not get adequate support from their immediate families, neighbours, and society at large. The Ashram is located inside the campus of the organization and lets the tenants of the ashram mix and interact with a range of people: young children, energetic young fellows to old intellectuals with whom they can share their emotions. The presence of a cross section of people around them day and night provides them enough hustle and bustle to forget their loneliness and get involved in various activities. The caretaker team is trained in handling the physical and mental requirements of the aged persons. The commitment of the young girls in taking utmost care of the inmates has created an exceptionally good ambience where old persons enjoy themselves. A panel of doctors visits the ashram at regular intervals to check the body vitals of the inmates and monitor their health status. The campus houses children who stay in the school hostel. The ashram management has promoted a unique and interesting concept of Grand Parenting where the children staying in the hostel are attached to specific senior citizens as grandparents and grandchildren. The grandparents are entrusted with the responsibility of looking after those children as grandparents. Conversely, the children to treat the inmates as their grandparents.

Best practices of Anandashram

The Ashrama has a big campus of more than 4 acres in a rural set up. The ambience is quite good in a rural setting. The philopsophy of the Ashram is based on self-reliancy and productivity by all the members. Spirituality practices are given importance in the Ashram as it helps immensely in accommodating to the life style of the Ashram and face future challenges due to old age.

We strive to provide a sense of love, respect and dignity to the old persons. As most of the senior citizens are leaving away from their family, they should feel as they belong to the Ashram as a family member and treat other members as family.

The senior citizens follow our traditional mehtod of joyful learning like reciting spiritualbooks like Geeta, Bh agabata. They also indulge in discussions and debate to enrich their Understanding and help other imates get an insight into the deep meanings which bringsjoy and happiness to all.

As old persons, they always need attention and medical care. We have a well-designed health support system in place to take care of the ill inmates. There are para-medical staffs to WHO do regular checking of the inmates. Blood pressure, Pulse rate and other vitals are checked regularly to ensure a healthy person. In case of any ill person, immediate diagnosis and treatment is provided through para-medical staffs. If the ailment is major, which needs specialist attention, s/he is taken to the district hospital at Keonjhar. There is a tie-up with the district hospital regarding this. In case of emergency, the old persons are hospitalized and treated till they are discharged. In very serious cases they are referred to State level super speciality hospitals.

We let the old person's age in a healthy way. Counselling is done to ensure that they embrace the old age, and positively deal with any ailments or problem if any.

We provide lots of recreational activities for the old persons to keep them engaged and settle into a positive frame of mind. They observe national holidays with all pomp and fanfare like Independence day, Senior citizens day, teacher's day, farmer's day etc. Apart from this, they celebrate the functions as per the culture and tradition like holi, Durga puja, Raja, Kalipuja etc.

The citizens are accessing entitlements and welfare schemes like old age pension and other benefits. We take special care for each inmate regarding this.

Grand parenting is a revolutionalry concept in the sense that it is mutually supportive to the old age persons and children living alone outside their family. We encourage that each senior person is attached to one or more child as a grandparent where s/he interacts with them emotionally and get a sense of fulfilment as if part of a family. S/he tries to teach them good manners, helps in education and reports and shortcoming. Thus s/he becomes a guardian for the children. This is mutually beneficial for both the senior persons and the children

Sai Anand Group of Schools

Sai Anand International School and Sai Anand Sishu Vidya Mandir are two schools with an aim to imbibe quality education combined with life skills and human values. The focus is on upholding the rich socio- cultural heritage of the community while acquiring contemporary skill and knowledge to become a responsible citizen. They need to realize their full potential and contribute substantially to nation building in the new era. There are 250 students, both boys and girls, studying in these schools. The unique features of these schools are: Strong base of spirituality. Utmost importance on discipline and cleanliness, Extensive use of interactive methods like simulation games, songs and plays to make learning a joyful experience. Individual attention to each child and encouraging them to reach their full potential. 9 A range of extracurricular activities including dance, songs, painting, quiz competitions and debate competitions to help the children get a high moralistic education grounded in rich socio-cultural values. Encourage peer cross learning through mutual group exercises. We have conceived these as educational institutions with a difference. The motto is education with a human face. Public schools have mushroomed in the urban areas. But children on the rural base are not getting quality education due to inaccessibility & lack of paying capacity. IDA is committed to provide quality education to rural children at an affordable cost. We strongly believe that quality education for the coming generation will prove crucial in eradicating poverty and optimal utilization of resources.

Outreach Education

West Singhbhum District, Jharkhand with the collaboration of TATA Steel CSR IDA addressed the unreached village education to the school dropouts and providing extra teachers to 10 government schools. The objective is to fulfill the school infrastructure need of HR to provide quality education in outreach hilly and mining areas.

CERTIFICATE COURSE ON "GERIATRIC CARE" IN COLLABORATION WITH TATA INSTITUTE OF SOCIAL SCIENCE, MUMBAI. A COE initiative by IDA:

The Certificate Course in Geriatric Care offered by Tata Institute of Social Science, Mumbai in collaboration with Ideal Development Agency, Keonjhar will produce a trained workforce to provide care to the elderly in alignment with the Vision of creating a more humane and caring workforce. The Course is designed to fulfill this need & provide care and support to senior citizens.

Goal of Certificate in Geriatric Care:

To create a cadre of skilled and compassionate care workers who will provide services in hospitals, Nursing homes, Senior Citizen Homes, Organizations of elderly and within any other institution which intends to move into the provision of geriatric care services.

Objectives of Certificate in Geriatric Care:

To provide a comprehensive interdisciplinary human perspective in provision of geriatric care.

To inculcate a holistic understanding of the medical, biological and socioeconomic& legal issues involved in the care of and rehabilitation of Older Adults.

To equip students with direct skills (medical & social) required for the care of Older Adults in the family as well as institutional settings.


